The Recycled Pilots group, local Parlin pilots, and the local FAAST Team representative ran a Wings seminar – "Getting the Most From Your Aircraft" - in our honor after lunch. Pilots were asked to bring their POH's and weight and balance information. Then, using the weather conditions prevailing for the day, we calculated exactly how much runway would be required to take off and land at Parlin. The exercise was quite revealing. Then, on departure, we could test our results by observing the marked lengths along side the runway. Luckily it was on the honor system!

Of special interest were the speakers from NASA who spoke on topics ranging from the Joint Polar Satellite System, source of weather image and analysis, to current exploration projects of the Mars Rover. Another popular presentation was by a pilot, Fred Hall, telling of his experiences in flying the Berlin Airlift in the late 1940's.

On Thursday evening the various Tribes made good use of the many fine restaurants in downtown Baltimore. The host NE Tribe chose one of the many establishments in Little Italy.

ICS-member seminars on insurance and maintenance were well attended, with quality cooperation from the vendors present. Other topics covered were the Comanche Pilot Proficiency Program (CPPP) and problems with aging aircraft, both in the form of an open discussion, and drawing on the expertise of our ICS President, Zach Grant.
